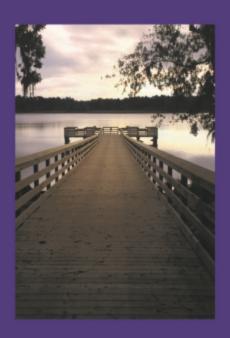
RECREATION AND RIVERWALK

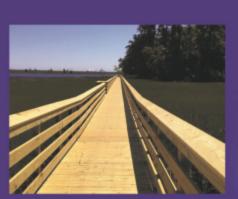

A key function of the Riverwalk is to incorporate and accommodate the NC K-12 Core Curricula via live interaction with the environment as an alternative to classroom based textbook study. The Duke Energy Education Pavilion is designed to satisfy live interaction learning. Classes held within the pavilions surrounding the wetlands and riverfront will be broadcast live via WiFi and Skype over the Brunswick County Wideband Network enabling live interaction by all 12,200 students within the school system.

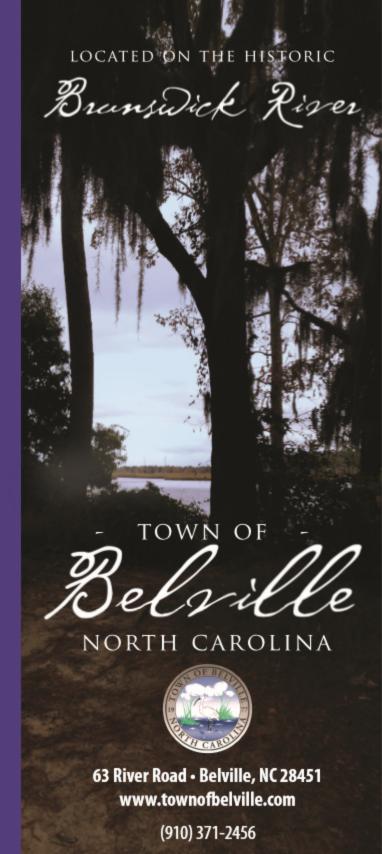




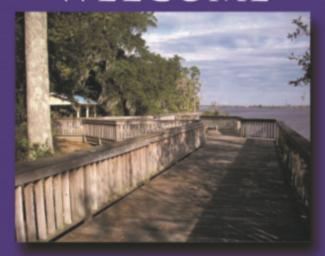

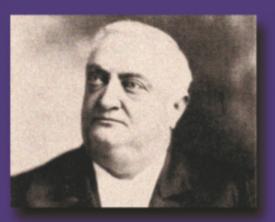
OUR HISTORY

Belville is home to the 200 acre Lincoln Industrial Park located on Highway 17.

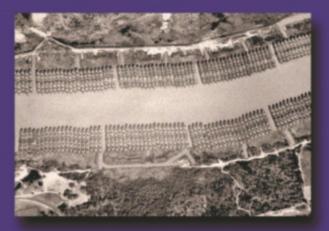

HON. DANIEL Lindsay Russell

Daniel Lindsay Russell, Jr. (August 7, 1845 – May 14, 1908) was born to a prominent planter family in Belville. Russell was the 49th Governor of North Carolina from 1897-1901, an attorney, judge and politician elected as state representative and to the United States Congress.



BELVILLE'S LIBERTY SHIPYARDS



Brunswick River Utilized during World War II

In 1941, just prior to entering World War II, the US began building Liberty Ships in the Belville area. President Franklin Roosevelt cited Patrick Henry's speech of March 23, 1775, with the phrase "Give me liberty or give me death!" saying these ships would bring liberty to Europe. On December 6, 1941 the Zebulon B. Vance, named after North Carolina's Gov. from 1877-1879, became the first Liberty Ship launched from the Brunswick area.
